#### TRUSTEES REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2006

The Trustees present their report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 5 April 2006. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Trust deed, the Charities Act 1993 and Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005.

It is with much sadness and deepest regret that we report the passing of the Settlor, Samuel Sebba, on 10 April 2005 soon after his 100th birthday.

#### **Background and Scope**

The Trust was created by a deed dated 16 March 1967 as a Trust exclusively for charitable purposes, and was registered with the Charity Commissioners on 5 September 1967, registration No. 253351.

#### Structure of Trustees

During the year there were five Trustees and a decision was made to appoint two new Trustees. On the 12th April 2006 The Lady Winston, and on 16 June 2006 Mrs Sallie Tangir were appointed Trustees. Of the increased body of seven Trustees four are resident in the U.K. and three are resident in Israel.

The Trustees are appointed by the Board of Trustees. The Trust deed provides for a minimum of three Trustees and by a further deed this was increased to a maximum of seven Trustees.

#### Governance

At the quarterly Trustees' meetings the Trustees consider general strategy, the areas of grant making activities and reports from the Chief Executive Officer and Trustees showing the outcome of such activities including expected performances and whether the Trust's policies are being fully implemented. The meetings will also consider reports and plans of the sub-committees including investment and finance reserves.

#### Management

Arising from a decision taken during the financial year ending on 5th April 2006, the Trustees have appointed a Chief Executive Officer. The daily administration of approved grants and the careful consideration of applications before they are put to the Trustees are delegated to the Chief Executive Officer and the Grants/Trust Administrative Officer, before being submitted to the Trustees for decision. A regular feature of the work of the Trust is to receive reports from the grant receiving organisations who must formally adhere to all the terms and conditions initially set out.

The smooth administration of the Trust is overseen by small sub-committees of Trustees and from time to time they will co-opt when necessary specialists in various fields of finance, medicine, social welfare and education.

Frequently, both in Israel and the U.K. specialists will be called in to assist the C.E.O. for more detailed understanding of the project(s) submitted for funding. These specialists will also ensure, through their monitoring that progress reports (relating to the continuation of funding) are satisfactory and indicate that the desired outcome will be achieved. A sub-committee will present its quarterly recommendation to the Trustees, when extension, cessation, or suspensions of existing grants are regularly considered.

The Trustees are pleased to announce the appointment of the Chief Executive Officer, Mr David R Lerner as from the Autumn of 2006. He will be assisted by a newly appointed Trust Administrator.

Accordingly the Trustees thanked Mr Clive M Marks, Chairman of the Lord Ashdown Charitable Trust, who carried out the smooth administration of the Samuel Sebba Charitable Trust over the last 12 years. Mr Clive M Marks has agreed to continue to act pro tem as the Honorary Finance Officer/Treasurer and is stepping down from his pro bono role of daily supervision. He has been asked to continue as a UK Trustee and for the time being will continue to act as Chairman working closely with the CEO.

#### Management (continued)

The Board of Trustees keeps the skill requirements for the Trustee body under review and in the event of the retirement of a Trustee or the requirement for a replacement, the Board sets up a nomination sub-committee to recruit the new Trustee(s).

#### Induction

The Samuel Sebba Charitable Trust has an induction pack and a comprehensive file submitted by Clive Marks and the UK Trustees to the members of the Charity Commission outlining, inter alia, the continuing process of strategic planning. (The Trustees are particularly grateful to the Charity Commission for their visit and helpful suggestions which are now being integrated into the Trust's governance).

As part of the induction process anyone proposed as a Trustee would meet the Board and the C.E.O. The grant making processes, the powers and responsibilities of Trustees, sub-committees and finance are all explained and discussed. The Induction Pack together with the Charity Commission's publications, copies of three year's annual reports and accounts and the governing deed and variations thereto, become the permanent possession of the new Trustee.

#### Monitoring

Monitoring is carried out, when required by visits from the C.E.O. and from time to time by the Chairman and possibly both U.K. and Israeli Trustees, together with a small highly qualified research team. Because of the stringent requirements to conform to the terms set out in documents relating to a successful grant, progress reports and outcome reports are continually monitored: this enables the Trust to support efficient and effective charities giving them confidence for ongoing support.

## Risk Management

The Trustees minimise investment risk through the use of investment advisers. General operating risk is minimised though regular review procedures by the Trustees of the Trust's activities.

The Trustees apply the total return approach to these investments, enabling them to make sufficient grants available each year and facilitating from time to time a major benefaction as well as longer term grants.

### **Objectives and Activities and Grant Making Policy**

During the year to 5th April 2006, the total grants (see also page 15) was £1,605,252, made up as to 95 grants of £5,000 and over and 19 under £5,000 (which total £43,200).

#### **Objectives and Activities and Grant Making Policy (Continued)**

The major grants continue to be for education. During the year a grant was approved to the London School of Economics of £575,000 payable over 3 years ending 5 April 2009.

Each of the Trustees has a specialist knowledge and expertise in areas covered by the grants, and each receives well researched documentation for the fields in which grants are likely to be successful. The objectives of the Trust are to continue with a similar pattern of grants for the next year. Long term strategic planning is revisited on an annual basis.

### **Achieving the Aims and Objectives**

Because of ongoing support to so many organisations already well known to Trustees, unsolicited applications are unlikely to be successful. However any organisations applying must provide proof of need; they must forward the most recent audited accounts, a registered charity number, and most important, a cash flow statement for the next twelve months. It is also important that the actual request for funds must be concise and preferably summarised on one side of A4 paper, unless the organisations are asked to complete our six page application form.

#### **Achievements**

The Trust has grown over the years. By the end of the financial year April 2006 it had put in place a staffing structure to respond to this growth. It has adopted grant making policies and guidelines, alongside its governance structures to enable it to deal in a rigorous, thorough and expeditious manner with grant applications. The Trustees are grateful for the guidance given by Dr Martin Sarner (medical), Mrs Judy Downey (educational) and Mrs Mina Miller (USA) (community/Holocaust studies), Mr Howard Stanton F.C.A. (buy-back advice and procedures).

### **Investment Policy**

The Trust has investments in a property company and other equities. The Trustees have asked their investment advisers, Smith and Williamson Investment Management to adopt a relatively cautious approach to investment that would not place undue risk on the investments. They are also asked to ensure that there is sufficient liquidity to give Trustees the freedom to make grants in response to the annual grant making cycle.

#### Financial Review and Policy and Performance

The Trust is reliant on investment income and interest (£910,364) and its fund balance of £50,450,158 as shown on page 7. The financial advisers are in regular contact with the finance sub-committee, and have pursued a successful policy of increasing the Trust's grant making resources (see buy-back below) and investments in a cautious manner minimalising the risks to investments by sudden world market instability. The Trustees expect to continue and hope to increase the present level of grant making.

## **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees consider that the present reserves policy is satisfactory for the maintenance of the level of present grant making out of interest and capital, and for any future plans which may require a cautious increase of these present levels.

### Post Balance Sheet Investment Programme

Continuing the buy-back programme as above, the Trust received in June 2006 £1,445,760 from the sale of 2,008 Ordinary shares of £5 each in Warnford Investments Limited.

It is intended that some of the balance, of each annual buy-back, will be used for the diversification of the investment programme, and for making grants in excess of the total incoming resources.

#### **Future Developments**

The Trustees, as explained above, are presently involved in ongoing discussions relating to planning for both the short, medium and long term.

They hope to expand areas of interest as follows:-

Welfare and Social needs Medical and Health Education and Research The Arts and Culture

and from time to time respond to environmental concerns and international aid.

### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year.

In the preparation of these financial statements the Trustees have:

- (i) selected suitable accounting policies and then applied them consistently;
- (ii) made judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- (iii) stated whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- (iv) prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and hence for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees confirm that so far as they are aware, there is no relevent audit information of which the charity's auditors are unaware. They have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make themselves aware of any relevent audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

## **INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT**

We have audited the financial statements of The Samuel Sebba Charitable Trust for the year ended 5 April 2006 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the Trustees, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Auditors

The trustees' responsibilities for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) are set out in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities.

We have been appointed as auditors under section 43 of the Charities Act 1993 and report in accordance with regulations made under section 44 of that Act. Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 1993. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees' Annual Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, or if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

We read other information contained in the Trustees' Annual Report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the financial statements. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

#### **Basis of Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes an examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgments made by the trustees in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charity's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the charity's affairs as at 5 April 2006 and of its incoming resources and application of resources in the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 1993.

#### **NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS**

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2006

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception that investments are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and with applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and the Charities Act 1993.

#### (b) Cash flow statement

The accounts do not include a cash flow statement because the Trust, as a small entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 'Cash flow statements'.

#### (c) Interest receivable and investment income

Interest receivable is credited to the statement of financial activities when it is receivable. Dividends and interest from investments are credited to the statement of financial activities when they are receivable.

#### (d) Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

### (i) Costs of generating funds

The cost of generating funds consist of investment management costs.

### (ii) Charitable activities

The costs of charitable activities include grants made and an apportionment of support costs.

#### (iii) Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees together with an apportionment of support costs.

#### (d) Investments

Investments are included in the accounts at market value at the end of the financial year. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are credited or debited to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they arise.

#### 15 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Trust, during the year, repaid £Nil (2005 - £1,844,170) to Sebba Holdings Limited, a company in which the late Settlor was a director.

At the balance sheet date the Trust held 57,200 ordinary £5 shares in Warnford Investments Limited (as detailed in note 9, pages 16/17), a company in which Leigh Sebba, a Trustee, acts as a director. The Trust received dividend income of £555,500 (2005 - £618,400) from this investment (Note 2, page 10).

Mr Clive M Marks, Trustee, is also a Trustee of The Lord Ashdown Charitable Settlement which provided secretarial services to the Trust during the year to the value of £36,700 (2005 - £34,850). These services were provided on normal commercial terms.

#### **16 POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS**

As a result of the de-listing of the shares in Warnford Investments Plc and the buy-back proposals agreed, the trust received £1,445,760 in June 2006, from the sale of 2,008 Ordinary shares of £5 each.

It is intended that much of the balance remaining, after each annual buy-back, will be set aside for the diversification of investment programme, and for making grants in excess of the total incoming resources.
